NEWS OF MEMBERS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

Frances ADAMSON (FCO Course mid 80s) is now back in Canberra after a tour of duty as Deputy High Commissioner for Australia in London. For much of 2008 she acted as High Commissioner, which gave her the opportunity to represent Australia on such occasions as the State Opening of Parliament (where she was presented to Her Majesty the Queen) and at the Remembrance Sunday parade at the Cenotaph in Whitehall. Shaun LEWIS (Mandarin late 80s) had lunch with her in the Admiralty Room at Somerset House before her departure from London.

Jay ALLEN (FAO mid 80s) continues to teach US History at Yeshivat Rambam in Baltimore, Maryland. The school has been reconfigured into separate campuses for boys and girls; implementing the change has been something of a logistical nightmare.

It is with great sadness we record the death of **Brian SUTHERLAND** (Cantonese early 80s) in January 2009 after suffering with cancer for some time. More than 300 people attended the service, including a full coach load from HQ 2^{nd} Division in Edinburgh, where Brian worked as a staff officer after his retirement from active duty. The General Officer Commanding (GOC) was present in uniform, and a piper played a lament as the cortège left the church. Our condolences go to Beth and to the family at this time.

David SYME (Mandarin late 70s) continues to serve as an officer in the Territorial Army, and was recently teaching English at the Ukrainian Military Academy in Kiev. He is still keeping fit, and was due to take part in the Adjutant General's Corps ski championships earlier this year.

Carl WORKER (FCO Course mid 80s) has been appointed New Zealand Ambassador to China, replacing Tony BROWNE (Mandarin early 70s). Carl was the last New Zealand Commissioner in Hong Kong before the handover in 1997 and he has subsequently been NZ Ambassador to Argentina. He is now back in Beijing on his third posting there, and we wish him well in this important senior appointment.

TROUBLE IN SHENZHEN

On 13 April 2009 the first batch of "Homeownership Scheme" apartments triggered a riot because of their serious quality problems. As many as 1,000 city residents laid siege to the Taoyuan Village police sub-station and clashed with riot police, leaving 10 people injured. The Taoyuan Village police substation confirmed the incident. More unrest among the 6,000 residents of the third-phase project of Taoyuan Village was expected.

Shenzhen City, immediately to the north of Hong Kong, has for the first time constructed 2,760 units of homes with a total floor area of 320,000 square metres under the third-phase project of Taoyuan Village, using Hong Kong's "homeownership" policy as the model. The prices of the Shenzhen "Homeownership Scheme" apartments built for low-income residents were only about 38% of commercial housing prices in the surrounding area. About 6,000 people in 1,600 households started to move into the apartments in January 2009 but very quickly discovered that this batch of "Homeownership Scheme" apartments were a jerry-built project where the construction had not been carried out wholly as per the design. The shoddy work done and the inferior materials used resulted in water leakages at the toilets and at the feet of the walls in every apartment. What is more, the residents are worried that the buildings are structurally hazardous. Recently the Shenzhen City Government finally acknowledged major quality problems with the "Homeownership Scheme" apartments and said it would accept returns by the owners, or 'change the basis of the occupancy from ownership to tenancy'. Nevertheless, a series of issues cropped up, such as the lack of compensation for home improvements carried out on returned homes at their own expense by many of the 1,600 households that had Recently several government officials were injured when already moved in. personnel from a working group of the Shenzhen City Government clashed with the owners.

The Taoyuan Village police substation took into custody two of the owners who had clashed with the government officials. As a result, on the evening of 13 April as many as 1,000 residents of the third-phase project of Taoyuan Village laid siege to the Taoyuan Village police substation. The owners clashed with riot police in the process of storming the police substation, demanding the release of the two people taken into custody. 10 city residents were injured. The residents did not disperse until after 11 o'clock at night. The Taoyuan Village police substation confirmed the incident and indicated that the people taken into custody were no longer being held at the substation.

It has been a matter of much conjecture as to whether or not "Homeownership Scheme" apartments modelled on those of Hong Kong could be expected to succeed in the mainland. The failure of the first batch of "Homeownership Scheme" apartments introduced may bring an end to the "homeownership" policy. Since the first batch of "Homeownership Scheme" apartments which went wrong involves up to 10,000 people, it is expected that more trouble will follow as a result of any failure to resolve the various issues.

美國駐阿富汗大使提名人、前美 國駐北京大使館武官陸軍中將艾江 山(Karl Eikenberry),26日在國會 獲得兩黨重量級議員稱讚他文武雙 全,臨危受命。

歐巴馬總統預定27日宣布美國對 阿富汗及巴基斯坦的最新政策,預 計他將下令美軍在阿富汗增兵,並 加派文職顧問,全面強化在阿富汗 的戰爭。

艾江山做為新任美國駐阿富汗大 使,將負責執行新政策,責任重 大。國會參院外交關係委員會26 日為這位華人女婿舉行同意任命聽 證。艾江山可望下周獲外交關係委 員會投票通過任命案。

即將結束40年軍旅生涯的艾江 山,26日非常特別的由超重量級 的民主黨籍參院撥款委員會主席 夏威夷州參議員井上健(Daniel K. Inouye),以及甫退休的共和黨籍 前參院軍事委員會主席華納(John Warner) 強力推薦給委員會。

華納稱讚他文武雙全,不但是軍 人、是學者,還是位政治家。華納 說,華語流利的艾江山畢業於西點 軍校,還獲有哈佛大學東亞研究, 及史丹福大學政治學碩士。

他曾在哈佛大學甘迺迪政府學院 擔任學者,並獲有南京大學中國史 學位。

艾江山來自台灣的妻子侯景苑26 日陪同出席提名聽證。侯景苑將隨 同至阿富汗赴任。外交關係委員會 主席、前民主黨總統候選人柯瑞 (John Kerry,麻州)特別稱讚並表 示值得鼓勵,他說這可以鼓舞美國 駐阿富汗大使館的士氣。

艾江山現任北大西洋公約組織 (NATO)軍事委員會副主席。他曾 任駐阿富汗聯軍指揮官。

艾江山並曾任美國國防部長辦公 室中台蒙事務科科長、美國駐北京 大使館武官、太平洋軍區司令部戰 略計畫及政策主任,與台海兩岸國 防官員熟稔。
