Eventually, after many sessions with specialists and years of my own research, I had to come to terms with the issue and start treatment. I now (try to) live full time as a female and have therefore had to change my name as well. It is difficult and I appreciate that many who knew me will not understand my decision – I can accept that.”

We salute Rowena for this courageous decision and wish her every happiness in the future. She is still an official of the Porsche Club of Great Britain and is responsible for organising events for the club. She has also taken up sailing and has a number of events scheduled. This year she was due to sail from the Azores to Cork, Ireland in a 72ft former ‘Round the World’ yacht to help raise funds for St. Margaret’s Hospice in Taunton, England. 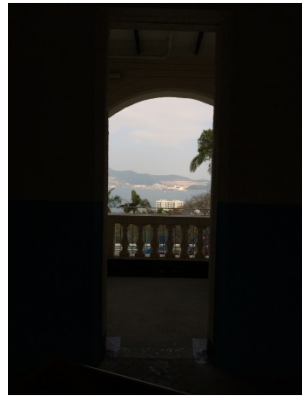

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REPORT FROM CHINA

As at November 2014, **JAMES RAND** had worked in China for a total of 23 years, starting in March 1985. This is a very impressive record and on his CV his most recent responsibilities include:

December 2013 to November 2014:

Manager of China Operations for China Greenfield Limited, a UK company based in Dongguan, Guangdong Province, with business travel throughout China. Work included the setting up and running of two factories in Changzhou and finding suppliers for customers in Western Europe of products including tooling, servo drives, automotive components, electronics components, scaffolding and textiles. In November 2014 the company ceased trading.

January 2015 to February 2015:

Six week contract with Airbus Helicopters in Dallas, Texas. See elsewhere in this newsletter for details.

February 2015 to date:

Technical Director of Dalian KWD Innovation Automotive Parts LLC in Dalian, Liaoning Province, which is a 50% German 50% Chinese joint venture with 520 employees, manufacturing automotive parts for sale to Audi, BMW and Volkswagen. Its current turnover is RMB 300 million (US\$ 48 million) per annum.

‘Occupy Central’ – John Shannon writes:

Hong Kong came to much of the world’s attention in 2014 with the occupation of some of its streets by students and others in late September, demanding that the Hong Kong and Chinese governments grant Hong Kong ‘genuine’ universal suffrage. The protests achieved little, other than to inconvenience the people of Hong Kong; however, they did raise political and social awareness amongst the people of Hong Kong and drew the attention of the world to Hong Kong’s political situation, which is no bad thing, I suppose. But, unsurprisingly they failed to achieve their political aims of getting the Hong Kong and Chinese governments to change their stance, and have probably put back democratic development in Hong Kong for the foreseeable future and they have caused the Chinese Government to adopt a harder line towards Hong Kong, being now concerned about subversion here. I resigned from the Civic Party during 2013 because of its support for the proposed ‘occupy’ movement. Sadly, my concerns have been proven to be right.

China’s harder line has impacted on me, personally. In September 2014 I was invited by the Chinese Buddhist Association to join its secretariat in China (doing English ‘polishing’ of documents) for the 27th World Fellowship of Buddhists meeting, held in China for the first time. Sadly, my visa was denied, because of ‘special circumstances’ and so I could not attend. Then, on Christmas Eve 2014 I was detained by the Macau immigration authorities for twenty minutes, because my name was ‘similar to a name on their watch list’ and then released as their ‘computer had crashed’! But, surprisingly, I was briefly detained when departing Macau! Strange. Is all this because of my pre-1997 activities, because of my membership of the Civic Party from which I resigned some time ago, or because of my letters to the *South China Morning Post*?



Headquarters 51 Brigade Osborn Barracks, Kowloon

Readers will forgive me wallowing in some nostalgia here. In 1969 I was a Staff Sergeant in the Intelligence Corps and posted to HQ 51 Brigade in Osborn Barracks. The Brigade had taken over the duties of the former HQ Hong Kong and Kowloon Garrison. It contained two British Infantry Battalions (one at Stanley Fort and one at Gun Club Hill Barracks) and a multitude of minor units. The Brigade Major was Michael Allenby, the 3rd Viscount and great-nephew of Field Marshal Edmund Allenby, whose troops took Jerusalem from the Turks in the First World War and for whom the viscountcy was subsequently created.



Michael Allenby passed away in October 2014 at the age of 83 and an obituary appeared in the UK *Daily Telegraph* which included this picture. He was commissioned into the 11th Hussars in 1951 and subsequently served in Germany and then Cyprus where he was ADC to Field Marshal Sir John Harding during the Eoka uprising. Postings to Aden, Kuwait, Fort Knox in Kentucky and Germany were followed by the move to Hong Kong. A tour of duty as an instructor at the Nigerian Army Command and Staff College came later and after several staff and technical appointments he retired from the Army in 1986 in the rank of lieutenant colonel, having succeeded to the title of Viscount Allenby on the death of his father in 1984.

I recall Major Allenby vividly as a charming, helpful officer, always with a gentle and unflappable manner, which made him liked and respected by all ranks throughout the brigade. May he rest in peace.

THE GENIUS OF WINE

An old gentleman, a friend of mine, regards eternity as but a single day, and whole centuries as but an instant of time. The sun and moon are the windows of his house; the cardinal points are the boundaries of his domain. He wanders unrestrained and free; he dwells within no walls. The canopy of Heaven is his roof; his resting-place is the lap of Earth. He follows his fancy in all things. He is never for a moment without a wine-flask in one hand, a goblet in the other. His only thought is wine: he knows of naught beyond.

The intelligentsia and nobles, hearing of my friend's weakness, proceeded to tax him on the subject; and with many gestures of disapprobation, fierce scowls, and gnashing of teeth, preached him quite a sermon on the rules of propriety.

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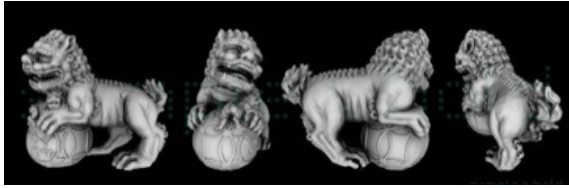
