Following her retirement she moved to UK for a short while before going on to live in Australia. It is also our sad duty to record the death of Simon Featherstone, a

member of the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office who studied Mandarin on a Diplomatic Course during the early 1980s. Simon died in post as British High Commissioner to Malaysia on 26 August 2014 at the age of 56. During a distinguished career, which included the award of Companion of the Order of St. Michael & St. George, he had been Consul-General in Shanghai (1994-1996) and Political and Economic Counsellor in Beijing during the Hong Kong handover period 1996-1998. He



was HM Ambassador to Switzerland from 2004 to 2008, before moving to Kuala Lumpur in 2010. An obituary was published in the UK *Daily Telegraph* on 24 October 2014 and can be found on that newspaper's website. We extend our sympathy to his family and we can report that Brian Finch provided a CLS presence at his memorial service, attended by over 200 people and that Simon's wife Gail will continue to receive this newsletter




'Jiza' – by Marie Lam

South Georgia of the South China Sea? by David Syme

A rumbling dispute over an island group in the South

China Sea reminds me of the time when, apart from my duties at CLS, I was Chairman of the British Forces Angling Club in Hong Kong. We fished the coastal waters at weekends, often in competition with local clubs. We turned up with vast tubes of rods and boxes of tackle; they came with small plastic



bags with hand lines and some worms wrapped in damp newspaper. They always won.

After one match a member of our team asked me for a word. One of the local chaps had told him of a fantastic opportunity for a week's fishing... "You chat up the skipper of a trawler in Aberdeen, see, and he will take you to the Spratly Islands. He drops you off on a deserted island with a rowing boat carrying food, water, camping gear, etc. and goes off fishing, right? Five days later comes back and brings you home. Simple, dead cheap and great fishing! How about it"?

I could not see myself taking a week away from post and family, but many of the unmarried club members were very keen. I offered to seek authority 'in principle' for a club expedition. A bid was submitted and approved. Two days later a fax was received revoking the approval. Sovereignty over the Spratly Islands (Nansha Dao) is claimed by every major nation in the area; too risky, so sorry, it's a non-starter. The lads who wanted to go did some research, claiming that Hong Kong trawlers were regular visitors to the islands, local clubs had been dropped off to fish without incident for many years, so could the authorities reconsider? Again I faxed off an eloquent plea for a review, and a week later a reply informed me that our bid was receiving careful consideration at the Foreign Office. Several months sporadic newspaper reports covered passed: diplomatic mudslinging over the Spratlys, but we heard nothing. I sent off a fax: "It is now twelve weeks since......" and received a reply by return. Yes, you may go to the Spratly Islands, but under no circumstances may anyone in the party take the Union Jack flag or any item of military uniform or equipment whatsoever".

By the time this authority came through the lads had booked a fishing trip to Thailand, so the risk of an additional complication to the Spratlys dispute was averted.
